The ecological destruction of the planet is proceeding rapidly, despite all the conferences being held on the environment and the climate. The gap between those who are living in poverty and those who are wealthy is also accelerating, within individual countries as well as globally. It is becoming increasingly clear that the current economic model, which is based on permanent growth, is not able to reverse these trends, but rather is part of the problem.

Given this situation Attac, together with its cooperating partners, has assigned itself the task of sounding out in particular the connections between the social and the ecological dimensions of the crisis, and of elaborating pathways out of the growth trap. How might a de-growth economy appear, in which social rights, ecological justice and a good life are the central supports. How might the world of work, finance systems, gender relationships, social security and property rights change, in order to facilitate an escape from the dead-end which is currently confronting us? These and other questions will be investigated during the congress, with more than 100 guest speakers in 11 podiums, 13 forums, 40 workshops,12 introductory courses and 15 artistic interventions.

mic Theory. Here, we shortly introduce Growth Theory, and discuss critical assumptions on the possibility and benefit of growth. We try to systematically summarize arguments and assumptions demonstrating the possibility of "too much growth" and "less growth is better" within neoliberal economics. In a second part, we explore growth in the transport sector, and indicate how reduced consumption can induce improved life quality. The course will consist of two presentations – 1. Sustainability concerns in Economic Growth Theory and 2. Sustainability in the transport sector – and exploration of these topics in break-out groups.

DESCRIPTION

Is the drive for growth necessary for capitalism? When considering the shrinkage of the gross national product do we also have to question capitalism? What are the potentials for a mixed economy? What developmental strategies and transformations to eco-socialism, to an economy of sustainable shrinking and sustainable steady state or selective growth are there? The discussion participants will evaluate the systemic assumptions of capitalism and pose the question of what should be discarded or transformed and how they can be replaced.

Although discussions about the limits of growth often appear abstract, concrete human beings must deal with the negative effects of capitalistic growth, and often pay with their lives. What are the connections between resource wars and growth? What responsibility lies with the global North fort he yearly increasing number of millions of people who loose the basis of their lives as the result of climate change? And what does all this have to do with Frontex?

The participants will identify historical and current dimensions of the social, cultural and multiple economic forces which drive growth, and discuss their interrelationships. What are the various backgrounds of these forces? Which ones are system-immanent, and what social and political conditions can explain their emergence? What kinds of regulation and qualitatively new approaches are opposed to these driving forces? To what extent is a comprehensive view of their effects necessary in order to establish a postgrowth society, that is, on an economic basis?

DESCRIPTION

Social relationships to nature provide the connection between society and nature, and are primarily regulated through work and beyond that as cultural symbols. To what extent do climate change, Peak Everything and the degradation of the biosphere represent epoch-making changes in framework? To what extent must new assumptions - conditioned by new approaches and institutional changes - be developed for behaviour that is consistent with nature? What does this mean for the productionist and consumerist life-style of the North, for the emerging classes of the South and for those people living below the limits of poverty?

The limits to growth pose a fundamental challenge to industrial societies built on fossil energy. Is it possible to convert these industrial societies through solar growth to a sustainable basis? Is a post-growth society based on the provision of services - at the same rate of growth - a way out of the resource dilemma? Or are both of these positions based on qualitative growth built on unrealistic illusions? Are post-industrial production and social forms beyond growth even compatible with the ecological limits?

DESCRIPTION

The current growth-based model is unbalanced. For example, whether global growth has reduced poverty or increased it is a matter of dispute. It is also a matter of debate, whether the exploitation of raw materials and related wars, destruction of bio-diversity, displacement of indigenous people, land grabbing and intensified migration - as well as extreme poverty in industrial countries - are necessary side effects of the drive for growth, or the expression of a misguided political direction? Basically, the aim here is to discuss whether growth is a hindrance for a just world in principle, or if it is a problem simply in this current form.

Left-Keynesian transformational projects which are based on selective growth, such as the Green New Deal, stand in opposition to concepts of a shrinking or stationary post-growth economy. These approaches are based on diverging assumptions, traditions and analyses with respect to the current crises. These should be subjected to controversial discussion: Can the world continue to grow at all, or are the rates of growth - primarily in the developed countries - going to continue to decline? What are the sources and driving forces behind growth: technological progress, innovation, population growth, consumer behaviour or capital accumulation? This podium will seek to clarify the basic question of whether growth can be part of a (global) solution if in its current form it is apparently part of the problem.

The question of whether or not it's possible to decouple economic growth from the consumption of resources underlies every discussion about growth, its limits and the guestion of a degrowth economy. Can decoupling be a strategy in answer to global challenges such as climate change, population growth, global poverty and unequal distribution of resources? What is the role of technical, economic, behavioural and political relationships and possibilities with respect to the problems of decoupling and increased efficiency? What is the range of the potentials for de-coupling, how long can they (over)compensate for the growth of the economy, for example, in achieving the necessary reduction in hot house emissions and absorbing additional side effects of growth?

Can problems such as mass unemployment, increasing precarization, distribution from the bottom to the top, and devaluation of care-work be solved in a society that depends on growth? And if so, then how? What effects have finance capitalism and the shifts in power set off by the recent finance and economic crisis had on the extent and structure of growth? What is the relationship of "good work", house and family work, and the informal economy to growth? What effect does the intensification of work and precarization have on industrial work, and on the provision of services? What role could strategies for growth play in overcoming mass unemployment, precarization and distribution from the bottom to the top?

Economic growth is widely held to be a necessary precondition for quality of life, social development and social security. However, quality of life includes much more than material prosperity and financial security: Being sheltered, socially connected, self determined, in physical safety, etc. Is growth necessary for the quality of life in all its aspects, or does a consumer society - one based on the drive toward, more" - limit the possibilities for leading a good life according to one's own ideas? Or does growth hinder a life directed toward goals beyond wage labour, does it de-value and block other socially necessary activities and thus damage the quality of life?

DESCRIPTION

The ecological as well as the economic boundaries of growth have been reached. What is imperative is a just transition to a needs-oriented, solidaritybased economy of reproduction: qualitative development without the necessity for material growth. However, if the "costs" of this form of transformation are shared unequally, many will lose their accustomed jobs, for example. Speaking abstractly, protecting the environment, social equality and good work for everyone are not contradictory goals. Yet there are significant strategic differences and goal conflicts among the initial approaches and transitions. The mosaic Left can avoid being split up only if it succeeds in organizing a just transition. What strategic problems are to be expected from a social-ecological transformation and how can we come to grips with them?

A central task of our age is to use natural resources sustainably and share them in a fair manner globally. The Green New Deal rightly demands a decoupling from dependency on fossil resources. Additional limited resources will be needed for the new technologies, which will create new dependencies and problems for the regions and the people living where extraction takes place. A sustainable and fair transformation of our global economy is inconceivable without coherent policy-making with regard to resources. But there are few solutions being offered and political alliances are also lacking. What contribution can resource-policy make to finding a way out of the growth dilemma? What approaches can we use to reduce the rapidly growing resource consumption of industry and the threshold countries, while at the same time making more prosperity possible in the South?

DESCRIPTION

What possibilities for configuration will there be for the social systems in a post-growth society? In this connection there will be discussion about whether or not models of shortened wage-earning hours and a base income without preconditions are compatible with positions criticizing growth, and how they could be related to each other.

What is it actually that has made us the kind of growth-dependent society that we are today? Here it's a matter of more than an economic critique of capitalism – we have conceptualized our entire mental constitution along the lines of the struggle for progress. Consequently, anyone who wants to strive for a great transformation must go beyond technological and political solutions and reinvent his mental infrastructure.

What demands on a possible post-growth society and the path to it must be made from varying feminist perspectives? In the form of a World Café, various feminist positions toward the good life and toward an economy beyond growth will be presented and discussed in a small circle. One focus will be on what growth critique can learn from models of feminist economy. And in reverse, we intend to ask to what extent a post-growth economy can be a feminist project – and if so: which?

The question here is how a world economy could appear in which degrowth is a possibility – it's a matter of the control of capital flows and requlation of financial markets. How could competition, orientation on exports and the business location competition – important driving forces behind the current growth – be transformed into global forms of cooperation? Must capital flow be regulated in order to prevent the flight of capital from slowly growing or shrinking economies?

It is important not only to discuss how a post-growth society might appear. It is also important to ask: How can the transformation from a growth-society to a post-growth society be made democratically? In order to answer this question, the actual power relationships and conflicts of interest, as well as the political and cultural resistance against this kind of transformation, must be analyzed. What openings are there for resolving these conflicts of interest and resistances democratically? And: How can a post-growth society guarantee and improve democratic participation of the people?

The guestion of nourishment is central when considering a post-growth society. To what extent has the growth paradigm shown itself to be especially damaging for human beings and nature? Does the path to a postgrowth society have to follow a subsistence perspective and the concept of food sovereignty? Which methods of land use enable the nourishing of the increasing number of people living on the earth?

DESCRIPTION

The deliberations regarding an economic system beyond growth are also motivated by the idea of achieving social justice for the people in the global South. What kind of global climate and resource policy-making is necessary in order to achieve ecological justice - also taking into account the centuries-old accumulated climate debt of the North? If the global South is to "develop", does this have to be along the same growth path which the North has taken, or are there other possibilities? Does the South have the right to growth, and does this mean that - in view of the ecological limits - the economies of the North have to shrink? Or does the global South have a right to an economy and society which point beyond the focus on economic growth? Are concrete projects featuring a needs-oriented economy and commons a possibility in this regard?

The transition to a society that no longer depends on the compulsion to growth necessitates the transformation of social and economic structures as well as other organisational principles. How can diverse approaches such as solidarity-based economy, commons, care-economy, economic democracy and global social rights be brought together conceptually in a "postgrowth society"? What are the roles of directed investment and economic democracy? What can a new relationship between market, state, solidaritybased forms of economics and new form of participatory planning and democracy look like? Where are the points of overlap in the debates on internalising ecological costs vs. decommodification, private consumption vs. commons, supply regulation vs. price regulation etc.?

DESCRIPTION

Work will have to be organised and distributed differently on the way to a society that is not dependent on growth. What activities can be reckoned as socially useful under the conditions of a society beyond growth? How can the critique of growth be connected to criticism of the focus on wage labour? What role can non-wage labour play, how can it be socially secured? Is successive shortening of the working hours and redistribution of labour a practical path for arriving at a post-growth society? How much shortening of working hours and time-autonomy are possible in capitalism? Which steps would have to follow? What are the possibilities for social alliances between growth critics and trade union oriented movements?

In view of the ecological crises, the question is how global justice and a good life for all can be achieved. Must societies in the global North consume less for reasons of justice - above all global environmental justice? What does this mean for the individual and his or her conception of a good life and what does it mean for social justice in the North? How can it be made certain that each and every person - regardless of just what their conception of a good life is - can have the chance to live according to that idea? What can the global North learn, for example, from the debates over "Buen Vivir" (good living) in Latin America?

There are already many projects which could be steps on the way to a society that is less dependent on growth. How can concrete projects such as the Jasuni Initiataive in Ecuador and the resistance against oil production in Nigeria be understood as parts of a socio-ecological transformation? Can these projects serve as examples for further projects of this kind, what would be the long-range transformation perspective, who could support them? How principally can the transition to a socio-ecological society without the compulsion to growth be conceived and shaped? In view of the energy question in the global South, this podium in intended to discuss how the concrete approaches to growth appear and which social interests and forces can be relied on for support.

Currently the Commission of Enquiry: "Growth, Prosperity, Quality of Life" is debating whether the GNP as an indicator for a good economy should be extended by other measuring instruments or scrapped. So the orientation on economic growth as the main measure of the success of a national economy is being put under scrutiny. In this podium members of the Committee of Enquiry will discuss with representatives of the civil society on the basis of the debated held in the congress, whether the Commission goes far enough with its questions, and where there is need for further action from the perspective of the civil society. There will also be an investigation of where there might be common points with respect to the growth question within the Left spectrum.
